GOD WILL NOT DESTROY THOSE WHO WILL REPENT - JONAH 3:1-10

Much like God did not destroy Jonah, knowing he would repent of his disobedience, so too we find that when the city of Ninevah does repent that God turns aside His wrath, Jonah 3:4-10.

God saw they would turn from their evil way. What evil way are we walking in? There are only two ways spoken of in all of the New Testament, and the destinations are given every time. On one way, we are traveling toward Heaven's goal; on the other, we are headed for eternal destruction, and damnation. Yet all who will turn from that way can find the way into heaven.

GOD WILL NOT RESTRICT HIS SALVATION TO THOSE WE DISLIKE JONAH 4:1-4, 11

I have never known anyone who became angry that they preached salvation, and one was saved, yet Jonah 4:1-3 says, "...it displeased Jonah exceedingly, and he was very angry. Therefore, I fled before unto Tarshish: for I knew that thou art a gracious God, and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repentest thee of the evil. I will now insert my dad's joke for the day; God's simple reply was a burn so bad Jonah needed some shade. "Then said the LORD, Doest thou well to be angry?" (Jonah 4:4). Did Jonah think God would not withhold his wrath on men, women, and children because Jonah did not like them?
